# artist bios

**MORNA EDMUNDSON** is one of Canada's bestknown choral conductors with a strong reputation for excellence. Passionate since childhood about choral singing, she obtained degrees and diplomas in vocal music in Vancouver, Bellingham, and Stockholm, Sweden where her teachers included



Eric Ericson. In 1987, she co-founded Elektra Women's Choir with Diane Loomer, a treasured partnership that lasted 22 years. In 2009, Morna became Elektra's sole Artistic Director, continuing the choir's strong leadership role in concert presentation, commissioning, recording, and mentorship. For 14 years Morna shared her love of quality repertoire with a new generation of singers in her role as Associate Artistic Director of Coastal Sound Music Academy, where she was Music Director of the mixed-voice Youth Chamber Choir. Morna has adjudicated in North America and Asia, conducted honour choirs in several states, co-directed the American Choral **Directors Association National Women's Honour Choir,** and gives frequent workshops with choirs of all ages. In 2000 she was presented with the Healey Willan Award for outstanding service to the BC Choral Federation, an organization she serves as a member of the President's Advisory Council. In February 2009 Morna was a recipient of the **BC Community Achievement Award**, which recognized her gifted organizational talent, leadership by example, and her encouragement of others to pursue their musical and choral goals. In June 2011 Morna received a Vancouver **YWCA Woman of Distinction** award in recognition of her work with Elektra. In June 2013 she began a three-year term as a Board member of **Chorus America**, the advocacy, research, and leadership development organization that gives voice to the choral field.



**STEPHEN SMITH** grew up in rural Nova Scotia, where he sang and played the piano from an early age. After initial studies in his home province in both piano and organ, he attended the **Royal Northern College of Music** in Manchester, England. While there, he participated in national and international competitions and won numerous awards and distinctions. Since 1990, Stephen has lived in Vancouver, obtaining his doctoral degree in piano performance from the **University of British Columbia,** and contributing to the musical life of the city as a performer, teacher, conductor, composer and arranger.

Central to Stephen's career is his long-standing relationship with some of Vancouver's finest choral groups. In addition to his work with **Elektra** (which he has accompanied since 2001), he is also resident accompanist of the **Vancouver Men's Chorus**, pianist for the **Vancouver Bach Choir**, and a frequent collaborator with **Chor Leoni Men's Choir**, the **Vancouver Chamber Choir**, and many other ensembles. Stephen is also a published composer and arranger of choral music, with a long and growing list of commissions from individual choirs across North America, and from such entities as the **British Columbia Choral Federation**, the **Women's Commissioning Consortium** of the **ACDA**, and the **Canadian Broadcasting Corporation**. Stephen's work as both composer and pianist can be heard on dozens of CDs in commercial release, including a solo recording of classical piano miniatures entitled *Kaleidoscope*, which is available on **iTunes**.

Scottish-born LORNA MCGHEE is principal flute with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra and has performed as guest principal with Chicago Symphony, Minnesota Orchestra, London Symphony, London Philharmonic, Academy of St-Martin-in-the-Fields and Chamber Orchestra of Europe. Before emigrating to North America in 1998, McGhee was co-principal flute of the BBC Symphony Orchestra in England. As a soloist, she has given concerto performances with the London Symphony Orchestra, Scottish Chamber Orchestra and BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra in the UK; Manitoba Chamber Orchestra, Toronto Philharmonia and Victoria Symphony in Canada; and the Nashville Chamber Orchestra and Oregon Bach Festival Orchestra in the United States. A career highlight was a performance of Penderecki's *Flute Concerto* with the Oregon Bach Festival Orchestra under the baton of the composer in 2004. DAVID OWEN received a Master of Music degree from the New England Conservatory of Music and is now principal oboe of the Vancouver Opera Orchestra and the Turning Point Ensemble. He has also performed as Principal Oboe and English Horn soloist with the Vancouver Symphony, Canadian Broadcasting Corporation Radio Orchestra, Vancouver New Music Ensemble, Canadian Chamber Orchestra, and Banff Festival Orchestra. David has participated in numerous broadcasts of symphonic, opera and chamber music repertoire, and appears in recordings on the ATMA Classique, CMC Centredisc, and CBC Records labels.

The Vancouver-based **BOREALIS QUARTET** was founded in 2000 and is regarded today as one of the leading ensembles in the world of its generation. Mentors include **Josef Gingold, Rostislav Dubinsky (Borodin), Andrew Dawes (Orford)** and **Emerson String Quartet.** A recipient of many awards, the Borealis's unprecedented success at a televised national competition resulted in a performance for the Prime Minister of Canada at the **Parliament Hill** in Ottawa for an audience of over 75,000. Since then, the Borealis has toured extensively worldwide to great acclaim. Their many recorded CDs also feature music especially written for Borealis. The quartet members are in residence and on faculty at the **Kwantlen Polytechnic University.** Performing on this CD with Elektra are **PATRICIA SHIH**, violin 1, **YUEL YAWNEY**, violin 2, **NIKITA POGREBNOY**, viola and **SHIH-LIN CHEN**, cello.


