Welcome to "Our House" ...!

Whether you are experiencing Elektra Women's Choir for the first time or are a seasoned fan, we're delighted to share our music with you today. We hope your time with us will be special and rewarding.

In Canada's rich multicultural society, it is unlikely that any of us share a common body of traditional songs with the people we meet in our daily lives. Popular songs, yes, but songs that our great-grandparents and their neighbours. and we and our neighbours share – hard to imagine! Unlike some cultures or some generations, we in 21st century Canada are hard-pressed to come up with a tune everyone knows, *Happy Birthday* and the national anthem being the notable exceptions. But Christmas is different. Choral musicians have a rare opportunity to connect to audiences through the traditional music of the season. It's a natural bridge we only have once a year. Many of the melodies we sing at this time of year are familiar to you. Not only could you hum them, but you may have memories attached to some of them, which means they have meaning for you before we even start to sing. A Canadian choir and its audience step together into this place of connection for a Christmas concert, and that's where Elektra meets you for *Chez Nous: Christmas with Elektra*.

We are delighted to make music today with our guest performers and to have you experience their artistry. Concert pianist Jane Coop is a Canadian artist of international stature. Every time I've heard her in concert, I've wanted to share the experience with the choir and with you, and today we have that chance. And we welcome warmly the Pacific Mennonite Children's Choir and their director Betty-Ann Vroom. The strong singing tradition of Mennonites in Canada has shaped our choral landscape for generations.

Several years ago, I wrote a list of words that I keep beside me when looking through music that might be included in *Chez Nous*. The paper is a bit shabby by now, but the words still ring true, reminding me of my goals; to make you feel welcome, to connect you to familiar music, to move you, to surprise you with something new, and to offer even those of you who have never heard Elektra before a sense of the music we present, and what you might expect from us at other concerts in this, our 30th year. I want you to be glad you came, to find today's concert more than entertaining, and to be glad you experienced this music together with other people. My list? *Welcome, Joy, Beauty, Participation, Robust, Sombre Reflection, Surprise, Memory, Relevance*.

Elektra Women's Choir from Vancouver, Canada has been a leader among women's choirs since 1987. Under the direction of Artistic Director Morna Edmundson the 55-voice adult choir is known for its adventurous programming, seeking out music written specifically for women and frequently commissioning new works. The choir is honoured to work with an outstanding accompanist, Dr. Stephen Smith.

Elektra delivers its mandate to "inspire and lead" through an annual concert series including new and commissioned works and featuring outstanding guest artists. In addition to performing worthy repertoire from the past, Elektra has commissioned over 70 compositions and arrangements. The choir's recordings on iTunes and CD Baby extend the reach of its repertoire internationally. Elektra's 13th CD *Still* was released in October 2015 – a collection of 14 Christmas tracks including many world premiere recordings of Canadian and international works for women's voices. Elektra's website offers a permanent repertoire resource featuring all works programmed by the choir to date. Elektra's celebrated outreach programs encourage, train, and mentor the next generation of youth and adults: singers, conductors, and composers.

A multiple national prize-winning ensemble, Elektra has been honoured to perform at conferences of Choral Canada, the American Choral Directors Association, Chorus America, the International Society for Music Education, and the International Federation for Choral Music. Elektra participates enthusiastically in shared projects with other arts organizations such as the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra and Chor Leoni Men's Choir, and in festivals and concert series. In July 2017, Elektra will be one of two choirs representing Canada at the World Symposium on Choral Music, in Barcelona, Spain.

Morna Edmundson is one of Canada's best-known choral conductors with a strong reputation for excellence. Passionate since childhood about choral singing, she obtained degrees and diplomas in vocal music in Vancouver, Bellingham, and Stockholm, Sweden where her teachers included Eric Ericson. In 1987, she co-founded Elektra Women's Choir with Diane Loomer, a treasured partnership that lasted 22 years. In 2009, Morna became Elektra's sole Artistic Director, continuing the choir's strong leadership role in concert presentation, commissioning, recording, and mentorship.

For 14 years Morna shared her love of quality repertoire with a new generation of singers in her role as Associate Artistic Director of Coastal Sound Music Academy, where she was Music Director of the mixed-voice Youth Chamber Choir. Morna has adjudicated in North America and Asia, conducted honour choirs in several states, co-directed the American Choral Directors Association National Women's Honour Choir, and gives frequent workshops with choirs of all ages.

In 2000, she was presented with the Healey Willan Award for outstanding service to the BC Choral Federation, an organization she serves as a member of the President's Advisory Council. In 2009, Morna was a recipient of the BC Community Achievement Award, which recognized her gifted organizational talent, leadership by example, and her encouragement of others to pursue their musical and choral goals. In 2011, Morna received a YWCA Woman of Distinction award in recognition of her work with Elektra. Since 2013, Morna has served on the board of Chorus America, the advocacy, research, and leadership development organization that gives voice to the choral field.



Pianist **Jane Coop**, one of Canada's most prominent and distinguished artists, was born in Saint John, New Brunswick and grew up in Calgary, Alberta, where she began her musical education with Alexandra Munn and Gladys Egbert. For advanced studies her principal teachers were Anton Kuerti in Toronto and Leon Fleisher in Baltimore.

At the age of nineteen she won First Prize in the CBC's national radio competition (the Young Performers Competition), and this, along with prizes at New York's Kosziusko Foundation Competition and the Washington International Competition, launched her career. In the early years she made recital debuts at Wigmore Hall and Carnegie Recital Hall (now called Weill Hall), as well as giving performances with the Toronto Symphony, the Calgary Philharmonic the Victoria Symphony and the CBC Vancouver Orchestra. In 1976 she was invited to tour the

New England States as soloist with Mario Bernardi and the National Arts Centre Orchestra of Canada in Mozart's Concerto in D minor, K.466.

Subsequently she has played in over twenty countries, in such eminent halls as the Bolshoi Hall in St. Petersburg, the Kennedy Center, Alice Tully Hall, Roy Thomson Hall, the Hong Kong Cultural Centre, the Beijing Concert Hall and the Salle Gaveau (Paris). In her own country she has given concerts from north to south: Whitehorse (Yukon) and Niagara Falls (ON), and from west to east: Tofino (BC) and St. John's (Nfld) and many, many cities, towns and communities in between. She is in fact one of the few who has remained resident in Canada throughout her career. Commissions from Stephen Chatman, Ramona Luengen and others have been included in both her live performances and her recordings.

Coop's love of chamber music has led her to collaborate with artists from many parts of the world. Her longtime association with violinist Andrew Dawes, and her more recent partnership with cellist Antonio Lysy have given her the opportunity to delve into the sonata literature of Beethoven, a body of music to which she feels particularly drawn.

Summer festivals in North America and Europe have provided venues for performances with the Manhattan, Miami, Audubon, Orford, Lafayette, Colorado, Seattle, Angeles and Pacifica String Quartets, as well as the Los Angeles Chamber Winds, York Winds, and such luminaries as Barry Tuckwell, Jamie Somerville, Martin Beaver, Jeanne Baxtrasser and Michelle Zukovsky. Coop is a cherished faculty artist at the Kneisel Hall Chamber Music Festival, the oldest chamber festival in North America, with Artistic Director Seymour Lipkin. (www.kneisel.org). There she collaborates in performances of much of the chamber music literature for piano and strings, and coaches brilliant young musicians from across the continent.

Her commitment to teaching is centred around her long time position at the University of British Columbia's School of Music in Vancouver, where she was a senior professor and Head of the Piano Division. In 2003 she was designated Distinguished University Scholar by the university's president, and in 2007 she received a Killam Teaching Award. In 1992 she was the founding Artistic Director of the Young Artists' Experience – a summer chamber music program for students from the age of 14 to 18 which originally took place in Whistler, BC., and is now held at UBC each summer. Its mandate was, and still is, to give the young people a wide exposure to art and life, thus offering in the daily schedule yoga, composition, poetry, philosophy and visual art as well as music.

Coop's reputation has inspired international competition organizers to invite her to judge their events over the past fifteen years: the Kapell (Maryland), Dublin AXA, Washington (DC), Hilton Head, Honens (Calgary) and the New York Piano Competition. She has also been a jury member for the Governer General's Performing Arts Awards, the Glenn Gould Prize, the Hnatyshyn Foundation Developing Artists Grants and various Canada Council grant awards. Her sixteen recordings, three of which have been nominated for Juno awards, have garnered glowing reviews and have been heard on classical radio programs in many countries. In December 2012, Jane Coop was appointed to the Order of Canada, our country's highest honour for lifetime achievement.



Stephen Smith grew up in rural Nova Scotia, where he sang and played the piano from an early age. After initial studies in his home province in both piano and organ, he attended the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester, England. While there, he participated in national and international competitions and won numerous awards and distinctions.

Since 1990, Stephen has lived in Vancouver, obtaining his doctoral degree in piano performance from the University of British Columbia, and contributing to the musical life of the city as a performer, teacher, conductor, composer and arranger. Central to Stephen's career is his long-standing relationship with some of Vancouver's finest choral groups. In addition to his work with Elektra (which he has accompanied since 2001), he is also resident accompanist of the Vancouver Men's Chorus, pianist for the Vancouver Bach Choir, and a frequent collaborator with Chor Leoni Men's Choir, the Vancouver Chamber Choir, and many other ensembles.

Stephen is also a published composer and arranger of choral music, with a long and growing list of commissions from individual choirs across North America, and from such entities as the British Columbia Choral Federation, the Women's Commissioning Consortium of the ACDA, and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. Stephen's work as both composer and pianist can be heard on dozens of CDs in commercial release, including a solo recording of classical piano miniatures entitled "Kaleidoscope," which is available on iTunes.

The Pacific Mennonite Children's Choir is committed to training and motivating children to pursue musical excellence for the glory of God, inspiring joy in the hearts of singers and listeners alike. Founded in 1978 by Nancy Dyck, for 38 years the choir has exemplified the best in choral tradition, discipline and dedication. The choir gathers together children from across the Fraser Valley, from Surrey to Chilliwack, and provides them with vocal training, music literacy classes, and exposure to choral music from across cultures and throughout history. The Pacific Mennonite Children's Choir tours regularly; this past July they traveled to England, where they sang in Canterbury Cathedral. When Betty-Ann Vroom was a teenager she met a children's choir director and thought, "I want to be just like her when I grow up." Little did she know that one day her dream would come true! She spent most of her life practicing the piano, earning a degree in piano performance from Trinity Western University, but after graduation found herself directing choirs wherever she went. The beauty of young voices singing together brings her continual joy, both in rehearsal and in performance, and she loves pushing herself and her singers to greater levels of musical excellence, for the glory of God.

In addition to a Bachelor of Arts in Music from TWU, Betty-Ann received an ARCT diploma from the Royal Conservatory of Music. She currently studies voice with Gail Suderman (Good Noise Vancouver Gospel Choir). She divides her time between directing the Pacific Mennonite Children's Choir, teaching choir at The King's School, her piano studio, and working as the music director at Christ Covenant Church in Langley.

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
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

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
















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
